## MISSION VIEJOROTARYCLUB BOARD MEETING Notes

July 11, 2001 YMCA 7:15 a.m.

**MEMBERS PRESENT:** Bill Kersten, Kathy Haze, Bob McQueen, Ross Boling, Rich Frieder, Marilyn Philabaum  
 Bill Kersten discussed the calendar of events for the coming with the Board. The events have been scheduled and are shown on the right under **Coming Events** Bob McQueen indicated he would check with Bob Duffy to determine the date for the pancake breakfast to be held at Esperanza school. Rich said he would form a team in late August to go to the orphanage in Mexico for the purpose of performing eye exams. Rich Frieder discussed the Fireside Chat to be held at his house and said that it would be in September or late August. Rich proposed September 8 and will check the date and confirm. Christmas in April will be the last Saturday in April. Rich Frieder suggested that the Corazon project be replaced by Christmas in April. Kathy Haze discussed Christmas in April with the Board and explained that people apply for help with various repair projects. Teams are formed with a leader for each team. The teams then travel to the individual homes of the people who have been approved for assistance and perform various repair projects. Ross Boling suggested getting a speaker shortly after the first of the year to help promote the project and encourage involvement by Club members. In order to encourage membership, Bill Kersten proposed a community service project which would involve every new Club member. The Christmas party for the orphanage in Mexico was briefly discussed and Rich Frieder indicated he would check the date.

**COMMUNITY SERVICE** Kathy Haze proposed to the Board that the Club become involved in a new project called "Family Pathfinder." She indicated that Family Pathfinder is an offshoot of Adopt A Social Worker. The purpose of Family Pathfinder is to help a family become more stable by providing various services and assistance by Club members. The Club's commitment to a family would be for a period of one year. Bob McQueen raised several questions concerning the project and asked for more information concerning the following:

(1)Would the family be a South County family (2)Are the members of the family willing to work or are working? (3)Would the Mission Viejo Rotary Club be a source of funds? Is it in the budget?

Ross Boling also asked if the support would end after one year or if it could continue indefinitely.Kathy said that she would check further and return with additional information concerning the program and the extent of the Club's involvement with a family. Rich Frieder requested assistance in organizing the clothing locker for needy families. Rich said that there is a lot of clothing which is currently being stored in large plastic bags which should be organized in bins, tubs, or wardrobe racks. Bob McQueen suggested buying tubs from Home Depot. It was agreed that a date for the organization of the clothing will be presented at the next general meeting. Bill will prepare a sign-up sheet for volunteers to spend some time on a Saturday in August organizing the clothing.

**VOCATIONAL PROPOSED BUDGET**Bob McQueen presented the Mission Viejo Rotary Club Vocational Proposed Budget to the Board. He expressed concern over where the Interact Club would hold future meetings, and proposed that "The Rock" be considered as a potential meeting place. (The Rock is at the site of the old Mission Viejo Library on Chrisanta and is close to Mission Viejo High School. The Rock is designed to be a gathering place for students after school and has organized activities for young people.) The Future Teachers award in the amount of \$1,500 was also discussed by Bob McQueen and he indicated that so far there had been no applicants for the financial assistance. The Board considered awarding \$500 in seed money to a prospective high school senior who intends to become a teacher and then awarding the remaining \$1,000 at the time the student does their student teaching. Bob also discussed the possibility of increasing the individual scholarships awarded to graduating senior high school students to \$400 per scholarship, or \$800 per school, for a total of \$2,400 per year. Bob also suggested eliminating the \$500 in the budget for American Field Service. Rich Frieder moved to eliminate the \$500 earmarked for American Field Service and use the money for scholarships. The motion was seconded and passed by the Board. The Board adjourned at 8:20 a.m.

### Medical van brings help to underprivileged children in U.S. capital

Thanks to the Rotary Club of Washington, District of Columbia, (D.C.) USA, a medical van is helping to bring medical care to underprivileged citizens in the U.S. capital. Cooperating with the District of Columbia Department of Health (DOH) and Children's National Medical Center (CNMC), the club purchased a Medivan to serve Washington's underprivileged communities, with a special emphasis on providing immunizations, asthma, and dental hygiene for children and youth. The van is one of the most sophisticated in the U.S., boasting cutting-edge technology such as telemedicine capabilities for on-the-spot testing and screening, according to David A. Hamod of the Rotary Club of Washington, D.C. The Medivan serves a variety of health needs and will stay on the road in D.C. neighborhoods throughout the year.
