PRESIDENT=S REPORT (Bob McQueen/Bill Kersten)

- o Adopt a Social Worker: Apparently south County Social workers are unable to pick up from Goods Bank. We have been asked to consider support of other social workers other than those in south County. McQueen indicated he would contact Kathy Haze to discuss options.

- o RYLA-Mugg reported that he has two candidates approved for RYLA event on April 25, 2003. Cost is \$250 per student which has been paid
- o New Teacher Scholarship: Club has one participant doing teacher training at present time. Recommend we promote and expand this project at our three high schools..

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE (Rich Frieder):

- o Ambassadorial Scholarship: McQueen reported that we are still looking for candidates for this Scholarship. Should be college sophomore but others will be considered.
- o Door of Faith: Frieder reported that the orphanage is in need of more bathroom facilities. Required Funds \$9,000. They also have water shortage. Source available via pump is non-potable. Drinking and food use water must be brought in by truck. There is possibility of connecting with City Water supply at expense of about \$10,000
- o India Sister Club: Frieder reported that the cliff-lip project was successful. Recommends that we continue to fund this worthwhile project.

- o Prayer Breakfast- Boling reported that this event which is set for May 1, 2003 is all set. Waiting for flyers from printer

Did you know that Saddleback College was founded in a private home in a small house on La Paz in 1967?
 Did you know that President Reagan dedicated the college in 1978 here in Mission Viejo and the college moved to what is now the present site of Mission Hospital and then on to its present location.
 This is just a few of the many interesting facts about our community college presented to us by Dixie Bullock (above) President of Saddleback College.
 Dixie was born in Witchata Falls, Texas and after graduating from Nursing School, moved to California in 1962 where she continued working as a nurse. Dixie then attended UCLA and received her Master Degree in Nursing. Dixie came to Saddleback College in 1976 and served as a nursing instructor before being appointed Dean of Health Science and later as Dean of Technology and Applied Science. In 1998, Dixie was appointed by the Board of Trustees as President of Saddleback.
 Currently 25,000 students attend the college, of which 10,000 are off campus. The college has had a very successful Nursing Program and since 1971 has graduated over 3300 nurses. Many of these nurses fill positions at Mission and other area hospitals. Also over 660 Paramedic graduates have come from Saddleback.
 Dixie and her husband live in San Juan Capistrano and they have three grown children (one of which is a nurse) and 5 grandchildren.
