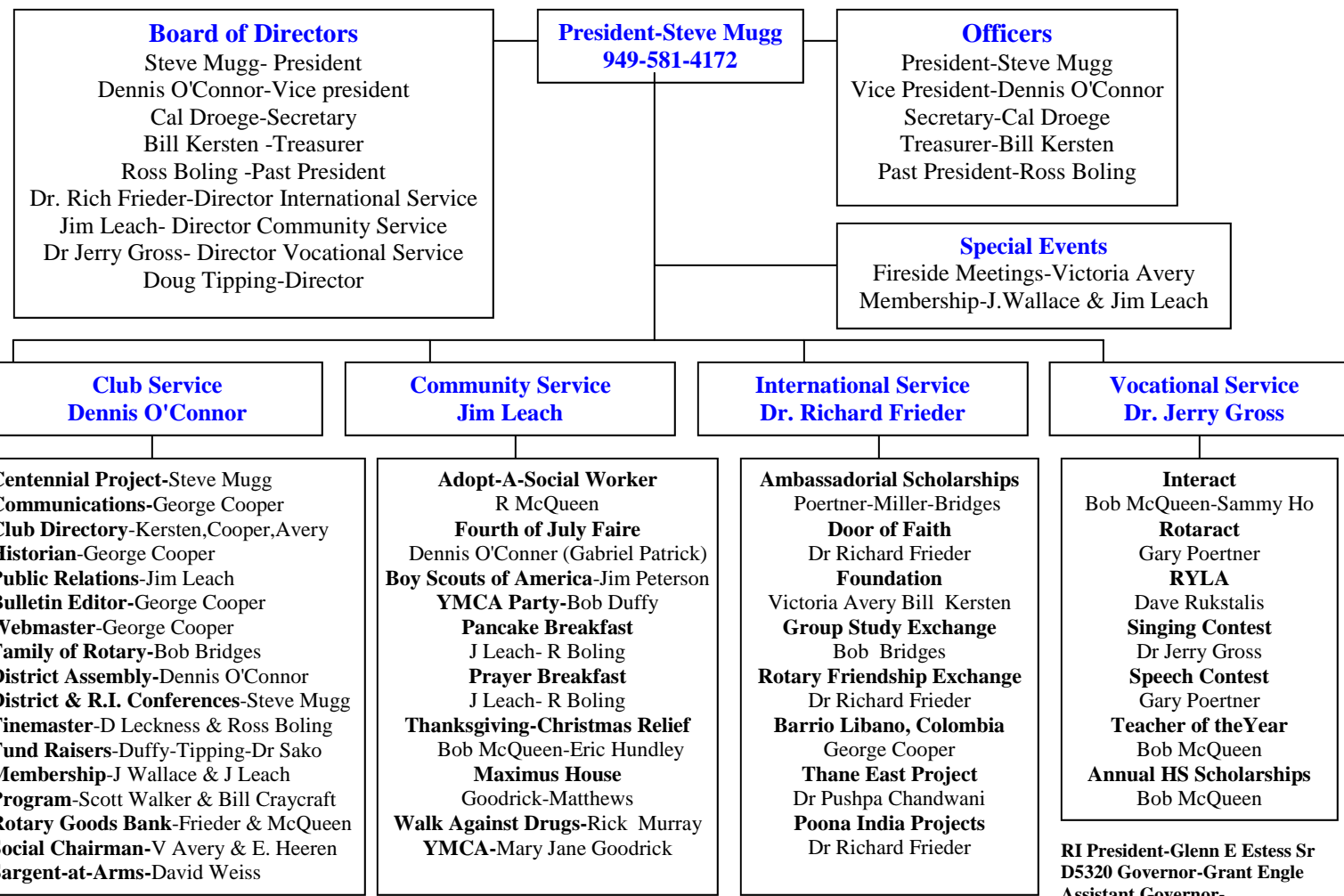

How did I become familiar with Rotary? The YMCA brought me to Rotary. I grew up in San Diego, specifically Chula Vista. The only YMCA was a non-facility Y that provided childcare and youth sports. I never heard of Rotary. I was however aware of the Lions Club. In high school I won a speech contest sponsored by the local Lions Club. What I have learned about Rotary over the years is this: Not all Rotary Clubs are equal.

The meaning of service above self became very clear and I realized that the Rotary Club had a mission very similar to my own and the mission of the YMCA.

Joining the Mission Viejo Rotary Club was an accomplishment of one of my goals. What I have learned about the Mission Viejo Rotary Club confirms my premises that not all Rotary Clubs are equal. GROUND BROKEN ON OUR HOUSING PROJECT IN LIBANO, COLOMBIA, SOUTH AMERICA

We talked to Brian by phone and he reports:

1. The bulldozers are up and running after a series of set backs because they had broke down.
2. The ground has now been leveled and is ready for placing of water and sewer lines.
3. The Rotary Club of libano met with the city to decide where to place the water and sewer lines.
4. Five families have set up a daily work schedule and are digging for placements of the lines.



The Rotary Club of Libano hopes to be able to provide the materials for all of the sewer, water, and electricity. The community will provide the manual labor in putting in these services as well as the construction of their own homes.

PROJECT DEAF INDIA UPDATE



"They Could Hear the birds sing again"

Dr Raj Desai, founder of Project Deaf India, gave us the latest word on progress of the project which our club has given support in the past along with funds from other Rotary Clubs. The latest report is that his team has dug three subterranean wells providing pure water, established a school and health clinic and distributed hearing aids to the children.

The primary causes of deafness in India were water pollution, inbreeding and chronic hear infection by pouring cocoanut oil in ears of infants. "Every child has some residual hearing. We give them a fair chance to develop throught training. The project ts three main goals:

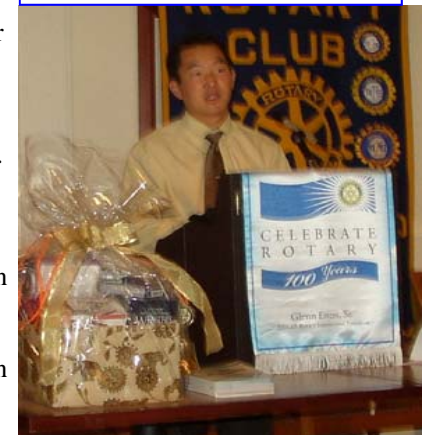
1. Early detection in new borns- Prevention is the name of the game!
2. Rubella Vaccination- Rubella causes 40% of the deafness which Raj personally experienced with his own daughter who became a victim of the Rubella epidemic that was sweeping across the U.S. in 1964. India does not provide a vaccination like we do here.
3. Program for Adult Deaf People- Establish a university for the deaf.

Dr Desai is a member of the Newport-Balboa Rotary Club. An article written by Raz has appeared in the Rotarian Magazine and Hearing Health on this project.

Our honorary member Col (Ret) Krishna Mathur met with Raj while on his visit to our club this summer and is planning to have his club (Rotary Club of Poona) join forces with Raj and Project Deaf India to help vaccinate 10,000 preteen girls in Poona. Estimated cost is \$25,000. Vaccinating girls today will reduce deafness in next generation.

Dr Aaron Sako again heads up our Entertainment Book Fund Raiser following last years successful campaign. We have been outselling any of the other Rotarians belonging to other clubs and Aarton pledges to do the same this year (especially with the help of the Kersten's!). Books are only \$35.00 each. Our target is to sell at least 231books. If we sell 300 books we make an additional \$1.00 on each book. And the beautiful basket you see in the photo goes to the number one seller in our club.
