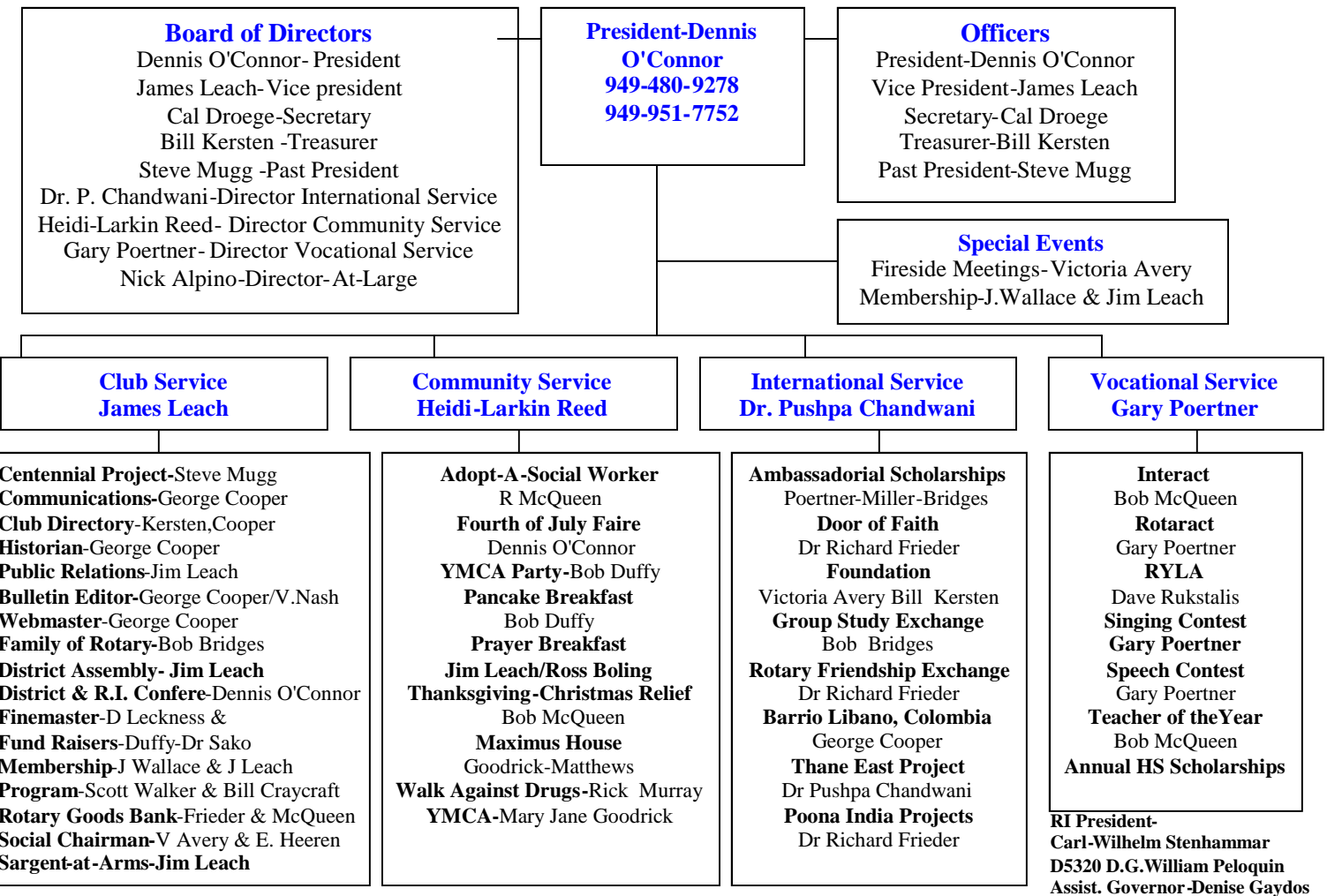

NEW ROTARY YEAR WITH JIM LEACH

Program Speaker

ORANGE COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY TONY RACKAUCKAS



Tony speaking at our June 6th meeting, gave us a very informative talk on his office which included some surprising statistics on not only the number and scope of the cases prosecuted by his office but the high percentage of convictions. For example in 2005, 77,000 cases were reviewed and charges were filed against 75,000 defendants.. His office has maintained a 91% conviction rate which is far greater than 40 to 50% that the general public think as the conviction rate. Last year the homicide conviction rate was 96%, gang crimes conviction was 95%, sexual assault cases-92% and family protection cases at 95%. Other crimes investigated and prosecuted by this office include forgery cases, hate crimes, elder abuse, domestic violence, unlicensed drivers and white collar crimes.

The DA has a total of 170 investigators working on the various crimes committed. And DNA plays a very significant part in the convictions which Tony feels is the finest tool developed for crime fighters.

The DA office also works on civil cases such as violation of environmental laws such as the leaking of gasoline into the ground by gas stations. And he has successfully prosecuted major oil companies to mandate cleanup of over 300 gas stations in the county

During his first six years as District Attorney, our DA has made reducing gang crimes his first priority resulting 6,000 less gang members and 62 less gangs in Orange County. He has served as our DA since 1998 and as a deputy district attorney from 1972-1988 he tried more than 40 homicide cases and well over 100 felony trials. Tony served nine years on the Orange County Bench as a Municipal Court Judge and six years as a Superior Court Judge.

A lon life believer in public service, Tony served as a paratrooper in the United States Army 101st Airborne Division. He graduated from California State University at Long Beach and Loyola University Law School.

ROTARY GOODS BANK NEEDS VOLUNTEERS

HISTORY OF THE BANK The Rotary Goods Bank made its start in June of 2000. It was preceded in April of that year by the Adopt-a-Social Worker program which began with the South County Service Agency and Bob McQueen as Vocational Service Director began working with a Social Worker who would give our club a list of needed items for poor families and Bob would appeal to club members and collect such items and deliver them such as dining tables, chairs, beds etc. Past President. Dr Richard Frieder and Bill Kersten were very active with Bob at this time in this Community Service project and in June 2000, Richard made contact with Walmart and Sam's Club to donate merchandise to our club and distribute the merchandise to the needy through the Social Worker. Sometime after that Richard, contracted with the Gifts-In-Kind Program to start getting merchandise from other stores. The club expanded the storage space and recruited volunteers from our club to pick-up, sort, repair and deliver the goods to the needy. We then expanded the number of recipient charities including the Door of Faith Orphanage in Mexico who twice a month picks up at our storage facility.

TODAY Dr. Richard Frieder, as Director and Founder of the Rotary Goods Bank will address our club at our meeting on Tuesday June 20th and ask for volunteers to keep this program going. For over five years, a committed core of volunteers have kept pace with the requirements of the needy and it is not "Fair to All Concerned" to ask these few volunteers to carry the load. **We need new hands in carrying out the mission of our Rotary Goods bank program.** We are needing
