

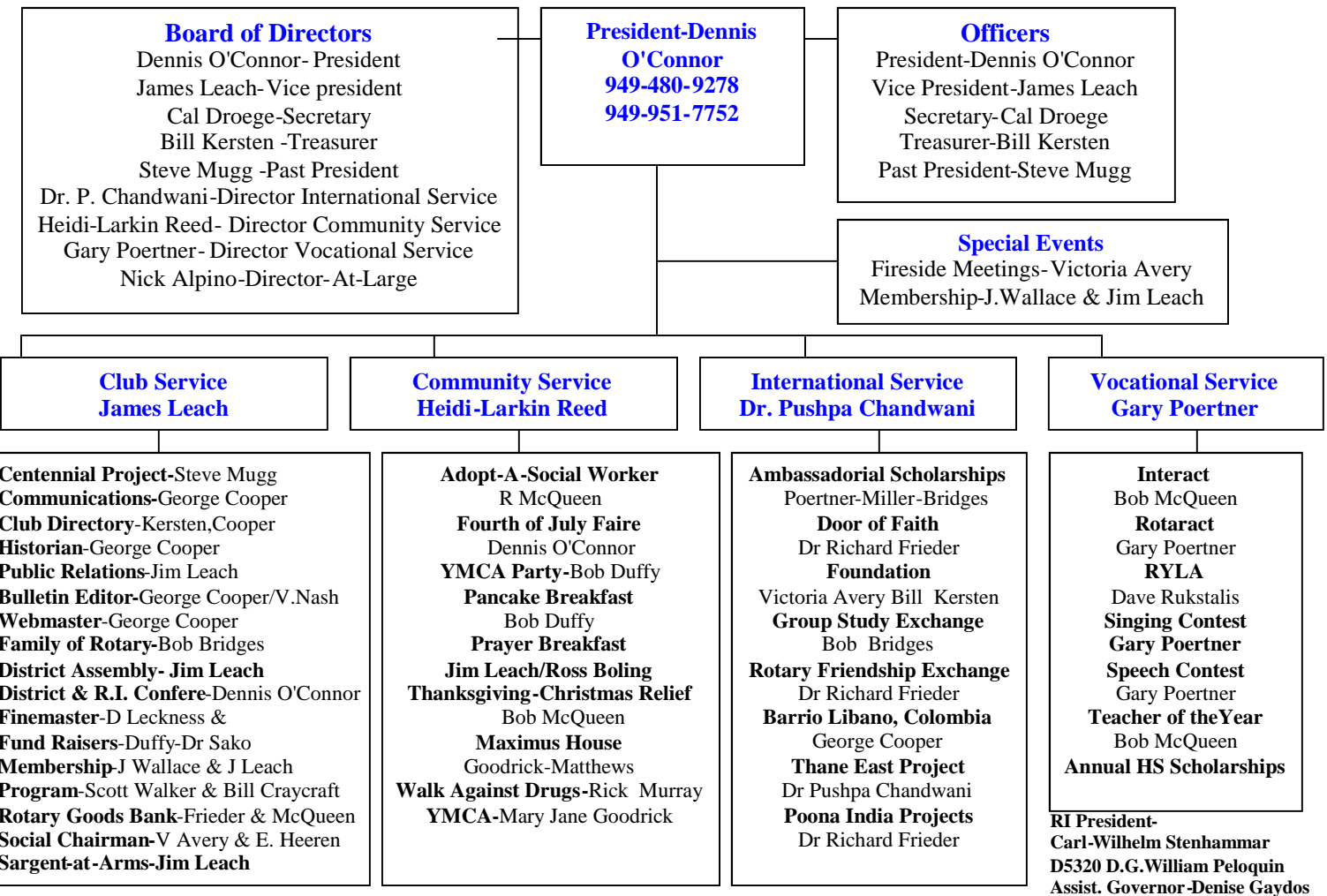

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

MATCHING GRANT FOR COFFEE PROJECT APPROVED!

Great news from the rewarding World s of Rotary!!
The Rotary Foundation writes:

“ Congratulations! Your Major Matching Grant application submitted by Rotary Club of Libano and Rotary Club of Mission Viejo for funding to help provide coffee roasting and packaging equipment for needy coffee farmers in Libano, Colombia , has been approved by the Rotary Foundation. The award is in the amount of US\$10,250.00. “

We also had the good help of the Yorba Linda Sunrise Club which we appreciate very much. Here is the Breakdown of the funding:

- Mission Viejo Rotary \$4,000
- Yorba Linda Sunrise 4,000
- Libano Rotary 500
- District 5320 6,000
- Rotary Foundation 10, 250
- TOTAL \$24,750**

The purpose of this project is to purchase coffee roasting and packaging equipment in order to do all the processing in Libano and thus increase the number of people employed in Libano and save costs.

The project will meet the needs of the community by improving the local economy. Currently unemployment rate is at 50% with very little opportunity to change. The project will increase the number of people employed which will allow the people of Libano to help themselves. Also it will help the local farmers by purchasing the coffee directly from them , and allow the profits to stay in Libano. The project entails employing local population to husk the dried coffee beans, roast and grind them, and then package the final product.

With an improved economy, Libano can develop better living conditions, by building better housing, improved schools, continue school lunch programs for poor children and much more.

Note: Libano is a small “pueblo” of approximately 20,000 population.. It is one of the main coffee growing regions in the lush green mountains of Colombia. But its beauty is often clouded by poverty and desperation.
